

AFTER SURGERY CARE INSTRUCTIONS

GENERAL CARE	FEEDING
Surgery day is a big day for your pet. It is important to let them recover in a calm, quiet environment over the next day or two. Continue to allow them to rest over the next 14 days so the incision can heal properly.	Kittens and Puppies (under 4 months) Your pet was offered a small amount of food at the shelter after surgery. Please offer their regular food as soon as you get home. It is important to keep their blood sugar up.
Please do not let them run, jump, or roughhouse during this time.	Cats and Dogs (over 4 months) Do not feed or offer water to your pets until at least two hours after you get home.
Use a leash or harness when you take your dog outside over the next 7-10 days.	After two hours you can begin to offer small amounts of food, preferably a bland meal, if your pet does not vomit after, you can offer another small meal in an hour. If your pet does vomit, wait an hour or two and try again.
No baths or swimming for 14 days – the incision must stay dry!	
	If vomiting persists, please contact your vet or after-hours emergency clinic.
INCISION CARE	
Please prevent your pet from licking the incision, which could result in infection or an open incision. If they do start licking the area, please purchase an e-collar at your local pet store. Please check your pet's incision when you get	For female animals, check for any excessive bleeding or drainage from the incision site.
	In some cases, a firm nodule will form at incision site (seroma). This is normal and will resolve on its own in 3-4 weeks.
home and twice daily over the next 7-10 days.	There are no external sutures to be removed, the skin is closed with tissue glue so it may feel firm and crusty. This will go away in time.
Redness and swelling should be minimal and should get better each day.	
	Every animal receives a bright green tattoo indicating they have been spayed/neutered.
WHAT TO EXPECT AFTER ANESTHESIA	QUESTIONS, ISSUES, & EMERGENCIES
While your pet is recovering from anesthesia you may notice some odd behaviors.	If you have any questions, please contact your regular veterinarian.
It's normal for them to be a little groggy in the first 24-48 hours after surgery.	Potential emergencies include listlessness, pale gums, persistent bleeding, unusual bulging or draining from incision site. If your pet requires immediate attention please contact your nearest emergency clinic. Any expenses incurred for your pet's care at a private veterinarian or emergency clinic are your responsibility.
They may also shiver, tremble, or be more sensitive to touch.	
Soft stool can occur after anesthesia.	
These side effects should wear off within 48 hours. Older pets may take a little longer to recover.
